Development of contaminated sites is an important objective with the availability of greenfield sites shrinking. Recognizing the benefits to contaminated sites development, communicating and understanding the goals and objectives will drive the approach and potential solutions to the environmental challenges at a given property.

Each jurisdiction approaches contaminated sites differently, however key themes emerge across all jurisdictions, including environmental due diligence, assessment of risks and liabilities, understanding remedial options and regulatory protections.

This presentation will focus on understanding regulatory requirements for contaminated sites in different jurisdictions (highlights from Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia), including:

- identifying the triggers for contaminated site (re) development
- completing and assessing environmental due diligence, including review of potential risks and liabilities
- determining and completing required technical environmental assessments
- developing and assessing the remedial approach(es) for the intended future use
- obtaining protections from future regulatory action.
